

Dr. Green Mom's Kindergarten Prep Vaccine Checklist

Dr. Green Mom's Kindergarten Prep Checklist is designed to help you navigate vaccine requirements and exemptions for school entry. It will guide you through the steps needed to determine your state's laws, explore whether titer testing is accepted, and prepare the appropriate exemption documentation—whether medical, religious, or personal belief—based on your child's specific situation.
